




I began employment while pursuing my degree.


Although I had previously been working in my degree area, I'll be continuing in the field of education pending a retirement in the library department.


I have been working in the field while obtaining my degree. I worked under an internship certification.

I enjoyed the entire program for my 2.5 years there. It was a personal journey that I decided to take after doing my research on many institutions' LIS programs. UB's came highly regarded.

I felt I had access to a wide variety of courses that were all of very high quality.

My professors were very informative.

The quality of instruction in the majority of my courses was excellent.

The instruction was good.

Most of the classes were well organized, current and interesting.

Classes such as "Resources and Services for Children," "Resources and Services for Young Adults," "Teaching the Exceptional Learner," and "Management of School Libraries" were the most effective at teaching me how to be a school librarian because they were taught by school librarians and teachers relevant to the courses. Real people with real qualifications who could use real-life experiences and examples from their day jobs to enhance the lessons they were teaching. Classes such as "Introduction to Research Methods," "Information Users and Uses," and "Information Life Cycle," which were taught by "scholars" without any real-world experience other than the academic world, were a total waste of my time and money. The one exception was "Reference Sources and Services" because the instructor made the content approachable, relatable, and gave us the freedom to apply it to school libraries as well as other types of libraries.

My professors were all well-versed in their fields and I feel I learned much from them. I did not have any issues with any professors in the program.


Dr. B. was excellent, was very reasonable in terms of expectations, and responsive as a professor. I took 1/3 of my degree coursework with her.

Hit or miss with faculty. Some instructors were fantastic and a few were sub par.

There is a good amount of disparity in quality with full time professors and visiting ones. About half of classes I took with visiting professors included an inappropriate balance of assignments (lack of experience teaching college classes usually caused them to assign too many, not very sophisticated assignments). Further, I just felt as though they didn't conduct themselves in as professional or academic a manner.

Had an issue with one professor who was extremely condescending. I asked for further help with understanding a concept and she replied "if you read the text and watch the lectures there shouldn't be any confusion" this is a graduate level course, i had obviously read and watched before asking for help. dropped the course and retook it with a better professor.

I was fortunate to take all of the top professors in the department (Nesset, White, Tamarro, Olivas, and Poremski. Professor [NAME] was the only faculty member whose teachings were good but [their] personality was far too arrogant and unforgiving to students. [They] was very cold and pompous. I may have filled out a mid-semester favorable review of [them] back in 2019, but I have had time to reflect on my interactions with [them], and I now realize [they] was far from being supportive and kind to students.

I ended up with several very strong relationships with faculty members who I believe will continue to be mentors for me in my future academic and professional career. I felt all of my instructors were enthusiastic and well versed in their field.

Only one professor out of the entire degree program had an online presence that came across as condescending and abrasive.


For the most part, my interactions with instructors was positive. The one exception was the instructor for [COURSE]. Dr. [NAME] was dismissive, lazy, and sometimes downright rude. When I reached out to [them] for help on an assignment I was struggling with, [they] stated that I wasn't putting in the work. And, when we met in an optional Zoom call to discuss the assignment, [they] added new requirements that were nowhere in the assignment instructions.

For the most part my professors were extremely kind and very responsive when I had questions, something that is particularly important when you are in an fully online program. I would like to mention Kathy Jaccarino and Molly Poremski specifically because I felt so comfortable and heard with them.

I had 1 professor that expected me to know more than I did when taking his class but in the end I continued to ask questions and finished strong. Other than that all item all of my professors were kind, understanding, knowledgeable, and able to answer questions.

I felt comfortable emailing my professors when I wasn't sure about an assignment or didn't understand something. They were all very accommodating and helpful.

Yes, there were plenty of interesting people to interact with, and the ones that I did group projects with generally did well in communicating and collaborating.


I have made friends in the degree program.


I didn't really have contact.





I never had an issue with specialized software or technology. I will say, however, that the Blackboard app is cumbersome.



To be honest, I was probably prepared to enter the field after working in the field for two years now, even without my degree. But the state needs a degree, so here I am.


It is hard to ever be fully prepared without just doing the job itself, but I think the program was successful overall, and I would certainly recommend it.



Do you have any suggestions for improvement?

I would suggest marketing this program to more minority populations and underserved communities to create an interest for that community and create a more diverse program of students and faculty too.

I don't have any specific suggestions for improvement.

I would suggest more archival options.

My only suggestion is an improved Blackboard app.

Make your notifications for important things regarding the portfolio and signing up for graduation more noticeable.

Group work is a struggle. Discussion boards most times feel like checking boxes, not authentic work/discussion.

Cut back on the theoretical courses. Add in courses about how to teach. I felt like my first class on how to teach effectively was in one of my final semesters. Things like knowing how to engage students, how to build connections with students, classroom management. These are all things that the classes barely touched upon as an afterthought, but the things that I struggled with the most in employment.

With this program you are also required to take a NYS exam, however, when taking this exam, there were many questions that arose that weren't necessarily covered within the program. Having a closer alignment of what we could see on the exam within the program would be beneficial.

The number one aspect of the program that is commented on when I have interacted with professionals in the field is confusion over the fact that we do not have a course specifically for cataloging. I think a cataloging course would've been more beneficial than Information Life Cycle or Intro to Research Methods. Or perhaps reworking the courses so you get elements from all three, but less in depth to accommodate.

At least two professors had posted only 15 or 20% of our grade by Week 14 of the semester. The timely feedback was lacking and frustrating

The program could do better at creating community through opportunities outside the classroom with the distance learners. Some instructors used good pedagogy and employed multiple intelligences in their teaching...some didn't. Even in an online program, there are better ways to create engagement.

Since the program is all online it would be easier for the students if the 'week' started on the same day for all of the classes.

More school based classes less "core" junk that does not help you work with children

I do feel like I did not learn as much about actually working in a library as much as I would have liked. The required core classes were more abstract and about theory rather than really useful, relevant job skills. The most relevant courses seemed to be reference courses, but they were offered only every other semester and because of prerequisites, I only had one real opportunity to take them but ended up missing it when it filled up. I wish that those directly relevant courses either had more seats or more sections so every potential librarian could make sure they can take those courses.

I wish I knew more information about what to do after getting my degree. Not one of professors talked about the public librarian certification I needed to apply for or the civil service exam we need to do to get a job. I heard these things from friends in the field and co workers.

More flexibility in class requirement groupings (where we had to fulfill certain subcategories and pick from classes offered within them). With such a short time in the program, I often wondered what classes of great interest I might be missing out on to fulfill those requirements. I feel I may have been able to tailor my education to my intended career just slightly better.
