Tip 1: Learn students' preferred names and correct pronouns

Incorporate opportunities and activities in your classroom for you and your students to learn each other's chosen name and pronouns, including through icebreaker activities, student name tags, attendance sheets, and student seating charts



Tip 2: Be aware of your own biases regarding LGBTIA+ students

It is your job to welcome and include everyone, regardless of their gender or sexuality, in your classroom and school. Try your best to check your bias at the door.

Tip 3: Use gender neutral language

Instead of saying
"Hello Boys and Girls" try...
"Hello Friends"
"Hello Students"
or "Hello Family".

Tip 4: Integrate LGBTQIA+ perspectives and authors in your classes

In History class discuss Marsha P.
Johnson and the Stonewall Riots
when reviewing civil rights.
In English class include works by
queer authors. throughout the
year.

Tip 5: Give students space to ask questions about gender and sexuality

Create a box for anonymous questions, and make sure to learn about these topics yourself before answering student questions.
